Meet the Caretakers for Seguin Island Light Station 2014

F.O.S.I.L.S. is proud to announce the new Lighthouse Keepers for this summer, Cynthia Privoznik and Dr. Fred Blomshield. They reside near the tiny desert town of Inyokern in the high desert of California on the east side of the Sierra Nevada Mountains with Mt. Whitney to the northwest and Death Valley to the east. In this very remote, severe and stunningly beautiful area they both worked for the China Lake Naval Weapons Center. They met as engineering students in the school of Aeronautics and Astronautics at Purdue University in Indiana

where Fred got his doctorate and Cynthia got her masters degree. Cynthia was a flight test engineer for over 31 years with NASA Langley, NASA Dryden and the Navy while Fred was a rocket scientist for over 31 years with the Navy. They are both currently retired from their DOD Government service and enjoying their retirement. Fred still does some consulting with government and industry in his very specialized field. Cynthia has concentrated on her painting, violin, ballet and needlework. They both enjoy snowboarding, biking, hiking, kayaking, backpacking, camping, scuba diving and traveling in their 32 years together. We will also build a cement pad for it to rest on and Paul Coulombe has generously provided the funds for a helicopter to bring the bell safely from Popham to the top of the island on the north side of the keeper's quarters. Seguin Island: A Lofty Gem Near Georgetown Summer 2013 Video Documentary

FOSILS was pleased to receive a video documentary hosted by one-time FOSILS board member and light keeper, Fred J. Kahrl. The documentary was filmed last summer and was presented to the Board of Directors last November. The video was recorded and edited by Patti Mikkelsen of New Gloucester Community TV. The 54 minute long video production was narrated by Fred and he interviewed Mary Hillery (one of last summer's light keepers), Lorraine Skolfield Lowell (daughter of Clarence Skolfield, light keeper from 1936 to 1946), and Tom Skolfield, son of Clarence Skolfield.

Fred recounts how, as a young man, he was influenced by the late Clarence Skolfield. Fred took a keen interest in the surrounding lighthouses and his frequent visits with Clarence motivated him to join the U.S. Coast Guard.

On Fred's behalf, a copy of the film was also donated to the Georgetown Historical Society.


Some of you may remember from our last newsletter that three different video production teams visited Seguin Island Light Station last summer. Fred Kahrl's production with NGTV made it four.

We hope you will warmly welcome Catherine to our team when you have an opportunity.






The Highest Award in Girl Scouts




Emma is a freshman at Rustin High School in West Chester. She hopes to have the project up and ready for the 2015 season.






FOSILS has five guest moorings available on a first-come, first-served basis. There is one additional mooring reserved strictly for Coast Guard use. Don't get caught using that mooring. This year the FOSILS's moorings will receive some preventative maintenance. They will be hauled and inspected and any worn parts will be replaced accordingly. The outer moorings are located in 40 to 45 feet water. Overnight use of the moorings is acceptable and a donation to FOSILS is encouraged. We encourage boaters to use the moorings and please do "not" anchor in Seguin Cove because of the submerged cable leading onto the island. Remember, you will need a small dinghy to land on the island after mooring your boat. There is no dock or float for unloading passengers. See the list below for Captains providing services to the Island.

Wireless Society of Southern Maine Sequin Island DXpedition


WSSM will once again be hosting it's annual **Islands on the Air (IOTA)** Saturday July 26th. IOTA is celebrating it's 50th Anniversary.

A **DX-pedition** is an expedition to what is considered an exotic place by amateur radio operators, perhaps because of its remoteness, access restrictions or simply because there are very few radio amateurs active from that place. This could be an island, a country, or even a particular spot on a geographical grid. "DX" is a telegraphic shorthand for "distance" or "distant".

Early DX-peditions were simply exploratory and geographical expeditions in the late 1920s and 1930s, in which one or more radio amateurs participated in order to provide long distance communications. DX-peditions are planned and organized to help operators who need to contact that area to obtain an amateur radio award. There are several awards sponsored by various organizations based on contacting many different countries. The base level of this award involves contacting and confirming 100 distinct geographical entities, usually countries, as defined by the American Radio Relay League (ARRL).

An "entity" for radio award purposes is any location that is either politically separate or physically remote (or both) from other jurisdictions/locations. For example, even though Alaska and Hawaii are politically part of the United States, they are separate DX entities (physically separate). Small countries, even ones surrounded by larger ones, such as the Vatican, count.

"Fostering connections" is part of our mission statement and FOSILS is proud to be part of the DXpedition tradition introduced by WSSM and IOTA.

"The Lighthouse Keepers of Seguin (Or how we spent our summer vacation as the lighthouse keepers on Seguin Island)" was the title of the lecture at the April meeting of the Maine Appalachian Mountain Club, April 17, at the Curtis Library in Brunswick.

2013 Lighthouse Keepers, Mary Hillery and Greg Guckenburg, who are also AMC members, spoke to some 60 people. When the audience was asked how many had already visited Seguin, almost everyone raised their hands. It is believed Mary and Greg spoke to a significant group of Seguin friends.



The Lighthouse Keeper's Wife

by Connie Scovill Small

With an introduction by Andrea Constantine Hawkes



In a genuine and remarkably captivating voice, Connie Scovill Small writes about her twenty-eight years of lighthouse living and service along the Maine and New Hampshire coasts with her husband, Elson. While her autobiography is a compelling narrative about a life of "people risking their own lives to help men and ships: a life of order and duty," it also inspires and encourages us to "look up and never down" in our shared search for a meaningful existence in the inevitable isolation and uncertainty of living.

This edition of *The Lighthouse Keeper's Wife*, prepared under Connie Small's supervision as she approached her one hundredth birthday, presents Connie's text supplemented with many photographs from the author's collection.

Excerpt from Connie Small's chapter regarding Seguin -

I loved being in the tower at sunset. When I took the lens cover off and the light flashed, I could begin counting from Portland to Pemaquid as almost simultaneously the lights came on-thirteen of them. It was like saying "hello", "hello", all down the coast.... The lights were lifelines to the sailors and navigators.
